- They live a mobile lifestyle moving from place to place in caravans.
- Have own dialects

- Most discriminated ethnic group in Ireland perceived as "misfits" and "drop outs".




#### What is Inclusion?

- Inclusive education is when all children have equal access to their curriculum. They are supported in learning and are encouraged to contribute and participate in all aspects of school life.
- As teachers it is our responsibility to develop schools, classrooms and lessons that include every student.

#### Inclusion issues that effect travellers

- Attendance
- Prejudice and labels
- Different perspective on education
- Language barrier
- Social behaviour
- Lack of education on the travelling community
- Poor relationship and lack of trust between parents and teachers.





# Lack of TRIJST

#### between parent and school

- Parents view teachers as a threat. Teachers have the authority to notify the social services of incidences which can result in the child being taken out of the family home.
- Don't understand each others lifestyles.
- Parents past experiences of prejudice and discrimination in the school system.

 School/teacher may receive no educational background on the child or personal information.

- School is unsure of educational commitment. No reassurance that the child will remain in the school.
- Uncertain of parent educational support ie. Homework and school attendance.
